Past Master Highlight James Joseph Heister Hunt 1854, 1855, 1865, 1866, 1872, 1878, 1880, 1901

Born August 19, 1821 in Evansburgh, Crawford County, Pennsylvania.

Married Nancy Converse on September 28, 1843 in Erie City, Pennsylvania. They had 10 children. Following Nancy's death, he married Lucia A. Davis on September 3, 1874.

He became a citizen of Naperville in 1844. In 1846 he opened a blacksmith shop. His first public office was that of sheriff of DuPage County, being elected to fill that office in 1856 and again in 1862.

He engaged in the livery business in Naperville as early as 1855, and was

identified with the business until about 1861, when he opened a hardware store, which he conducted until 1882.

He served as a Justice of the Peace for over 30 years and was Village President of Naperville in 1877, 1878, and Mayor in 1890.

Euclid Lodge held their meetings for several years on the second floor of his building located at the northwest corner of Van Buren Avenue and Washington Street.

He was initiated in Euclid Lodge May 28, 1850; passed June 18, 1850, and raised June 25, 1850. In 1851 he was elected Junior Deacon. In 1852 Junior Warden, and elected Wor-

shipful Master in 1854, 1855, 1865, 1866, 1872, 1878, 1880, and 1901. He also served as Senior Warden in 1862 and 1879, as Senior Steward in 1875, 1896, and 1902, as Junior Steward in 1867 and 1873. He had always been one of Euclid's most active members, and only through his efforts was it that the lodge retained its charter during the crucial test of 1863-1864.

He also served as High Priest of Euclid Chapter No. 13, R.A.M. in 1858, 1859, 1862, 1863, 1864, 1865, 1866, 1872, 1873, 1874, 1879, 1881, 1882, 1883, and 1884.

Died February 7, 1905 in Naperville, DuPage County,

WM Euclid Lodge

American Masonic History - A.F.& A.M. versus F. & A.M.

I've been asked why Masons of Wisconsin are called F&AM while we in Illinois are called AF&AM. The answer is that each was originally chartered from a different jurisdiction. How did that happen? Illinois was chartered from the Grand Lodge of New York which had received it's authority from the Grand Lodge of London, England which was Free and Accepted Masons.

Wisconsin was chartered from Boston who's authority came from the Grand Lodge of "Moderns" Free and Accepted Masons also of London.

The Grand Lodge of Ancient Free & Accepted Masons originated when four London lodges met in 1716 at the Apple Tree Inn. Their intent was to return to fundamentals and standardize lodge ceremonies and ritual. June 24, 1717, on St. John the Baptist Day, they met at the Goose and Grid Iron Ale House and formed a Grand Lodge. They elected the Honourable Anthony Sayer, a "gentleman" as the first Grand Master.

A doctor, James Anderson, a Presbyterian Minister, after studying a collection of Masonic documents and proceedings, authored what became known as Anderson's Constitution. With some revisions it was adopted by the Grand Lodge in 1723. The constitution set forth a uniform ceremony and proceedings to govern Masonic Lodges that were chartered from their jurisdictions. Lodges were to have two levels of membership; entered apprentices and Fellowcrafts. The presiding officer was given the title of Master.

There were a number of other lodges that observed that Anderson's Constitution had omitted any reference to Christianity, and had overlooked completely, the Hiramic legend. Lodges originating from the Athelstan Proclamation of York in 926, observed that many chivalric traditions had been overlooked.

This led to the formation in 1726, of a Freemason's Company. They soon became known as the "Moderns".

During the period of divided (rival) Grand Lodge jurisdictions, prior to the American Revolution in the colonies, many jurisdictions evolved. The Grand Lodge of Scotland issued charters to many lodges in Canada as well as throughout the budding Commonwealth. Both the Ancients and the Moderns issued charters throughout the American Colonies.

Throughout the colonial period British military lodges under warrant from the Grand Lodge of Ireland, formed a number of colonial lodges as immemorial lodges. After the American victory these lodges were without an official charter. It was not long for the "colonies" to be states and each state formed its own Grand Lodge for their own geographic jurisdictions. It was the practice to retain the ceremonies and ritual that they had come from.

Soon the different State Grand Lodges issued Grand Jurisdictions to newer states that had been formed. In various locations lodges still follow the ceremonies and ritual and retain the traditions that they originated from. If you visit a Wisconsin Lodge you will see things done differently than as we would here.
