Past Master Highlight

He was born June 26, 1829 in Anklam, Prussia.

Charles received an ordinary education in the schools of his native land, and, at the age of fourteen, was apprenticed to the barbers trade in Stettin, Prussia.

After learning his trade, he worked as journeyman in a number of the leading cities of Germany. From Berlin he went to London, England, where he stayed two years; thence to Liverpool, remaining there a year; and thence, in 1852, to America, and settled in New York City.

In New York, in 1855, he married Eliza Jeep, a native of Hanover, Germany, who bore him five children,

He worked as a journeyman barber in New York for three and a half years, then opened a shop of his own,

Charles Schulz 1877, 1883

which he carried on for a year and a half, then sold out and came to Chicago, intending to locate permanently there, but, not liking the appearance of the city at that time, came to Naperville and opened a shop, and conducted business there.

In 1859, he added the tobacco and cigar business; in 1873, sold out the barber business to one of his apprentices, and devoted his entire attention to the tobacco and cigar trade, which grew to large proportions, he traveling and selling goods in the adjoining counties. In December, 1874, the frame building owned by Mr. Schulz, containing the tobacco store and barber shop, was destroyed by fire, he suffering a loss of about \$10,000, insurance only covered \$1,000.

After the fire, he purchased the good will of his former barber business and opened a shop, keeping also a stock of tobacco and cigars; improved the site of his former business place, to which he added a lot, and built his present twostory brick block, 30x70, located corner of Main and Jefferson streets, now occupied by the post office and his tobacco and barber business. (Starbucks) In January, 1882.

Died June 17, 1898 in Naperville, DuPage County, Illinois.

He also served Euclid Lodge as Junior Warden, Treasurer, Secretary, Senior and Junior Steward.

Buried in Naperville cemetery.

ROYAL ARCH MASONRY AND THE YORK RITE

It should be repeated here that the fundamentals of Freemasonry are found in the three Degrees of the "Blue Lodge." Especially is this true when due consideration is given to the fact that Royal Arch Masonry was once a part of the Third Degree of "Blue Lodge Masonry." A Master Mason, no matter what added honors he may receive in his advancement to higher degrees in either "York Rite" Masonry or "Scottish Rite" Masonry, is a full-fledged Mason in the highest sense of the term. If he keeps his vows as a Master Mason, if he assimilates the principles of the Order thus made known to him, if he obeys the tenets and teachings thus far inculcated, if his life is conformed to the ideals set forth in the Degrees already conferred upon him, he has attained all there is, fulfilled all there is, and received all there is in the Masonic Fraternity. The higher Degrees are desirable, however, for the implementation of "Blue Lodge Masonry" and for enlarged opportunities and advantages in ministries of a distinct Masonic character.

It is impossible to place with certainty the date when the work of the Royal Arch was severed from the Third Degree of the Blue Lodge, or when Royal Arch Masonry was set up as a distinct branch of the Order. It appears certain, however, that the Royal Arch as apart from "Blue Lodge Masonry" originated in the city of York in England, and that Masonic assemblies under this designation were held in different parts of England, Ireland, and Scotland in the early part of the eighteenth century, and that it was introduced into America during the same period. The Royal Arch is known as the "Chapter," and consists of four degrees. They are Mark Master, Past Master, Most Excellent Master, and the Royal Arch. These degrees are implementations of the Third Degree of the Blue Lodge: they are a continuance rather than an amplification of Ancient Craft Masonry: they belong within the scope of Speculative Masonry in a much more decided sense than any other higher Degrees. The legends and symbols of these degrees relate to the history of king Solomon's Temple after its completion and dedication, to the destruction of the Temple by the Chaldeans and the Babylonian Captivity of the Jews, and to the erection of the Second Temple by Zerubbabel. A distinct connection with the Third Degree of the Blue Lodge is the "recovery of certain secrets" which were lost when Hiram Abif was slain.
