Past Master Highlight Harvey Edwin Kailer 1908

Harvey Edwin Kailer was born Christmas Day, December 25, 1877, in Naperville, DuPage County, Illinois the son of Fred and Melvinia Kailer. He was married to Almeda E. Smith of Aurora.

He graduated from the West Side school and from the Commercial Department of North-Western (North Central) College. He then went into the clothing business with his father and then later with his brotherin-law as Kailer and Brossman.

After marrying Almeda he went into the manufacturing business in Chicago. He was also an inventor, holding patents in 1915 for preventing the freezing of cooling systems of automobiles, and in 1919 for bracing the Chassis-frames, running boards and fenders of automobiles.

He was raised a Master Mason in Euclid Lodge on Februay 2, 1904. He also served as High Priest of Euclid Chapter No. 13 in 1909, 1910, and 1911.

He died April 16, 1950, in Aurora, Kane County, Illinois. Cremation was at Oak Ridge Abbey.

Now I'm losing my mind and body Death is near, but I don't despair I've lived my life upon the level And I'm dying on the square.


Sometimes the greatest lessons Are those that are learned anew And the old man in the park today Has changed my point of view.
