Past Master Highlight Norman Nixon Lewis 1953, 1957

Norman Nixon Lewis was born October 11, 1905 in Scranton, Lackawanna County, Pennsylvania the son of Charles Benjamin Lewis and Amy Hannah Nixon. He moved to Naperville in 1934 from Libertyville, Illinois with his wife, Marie Christina Winterberg, who he married in 1929. They were the parents of one daughter, Norma Marie (John J. Perucca). He was a plastering contractor in Libertyville, and opened a paint store in the Joseph Naper building at 216/218 S. Main St. when he came to Naperville. He operated the store from 1939 to 1972. He was raised a Master Mason May 4, 1948 in Euclid Lodge and served as Master n 1953 and 1957. He was exalted a Royal Arch Mason September 22, 1948 in Euclid Chapter No. 13, Royal Arch Masons and served as High Priest in 1951,1952, 1964 and 1965. He was also a member of Aurora Commandery No. 22 and the Scottish Rite Valley of Chicago. He served as Worthy Patron of the Althea Chapter of the Order of Eastern Star. He died April 20, 1985 in Morris, Grundy County, Illinois and was buried in Mt. Carmel Cemetery, Morris, Illinois.

ILLINOIS MASONIC ACADEMIC BOWL

Euclid Lodge No. 65 had the honor of sponsoring two High School Academic teams in the annual Illinois Academic Bowl Tournament, Naperville North and Naperville Central High Schools.

The sectional tournament was held at the Metea Valley High School on Eola Road in Aurora on Saturday, February 15.

Brothers Paul Felstrup, Joseph Ingraffia, Jerry Yingling, William Dixon, Neville Diamond and Timothy Ory were in attendance and supporting these two teams of impressive young men and women.

The day started in the forum room where the schedule of the mornings matches were distributed and the rules and protocols were reviewed.

Competition began at 8:45 a.m. and a total of 5 rounds were held to determine the four final teams for the afternoons rounds.

Naperville North's team started out strong with an incredible round, defeating East Aurora 450 to 90. Their second match against Wheaton North went down to the wire. At the end of all of the initial questions, the two teams were tied, 290 to 290. The sudden death question was answered correctly by Naperville North earning them

the victory. North went on into their third match of the morning and handily defeated Romeoville, 370 to 120. Naperville Central drew the Illinois Math and Science Academy for their first match and had a respectable 250 to IMSA's 390. They fared better against Glenbard South, notching a win with a score of 350 to 180. In their third match, against Geneva, they scored 270 to 260, but due to a 30 point deduct for a uniform violation, they lost this match. Central then went up against Waubonsie Valley in their fourth match of the morning and were defeated 320 to 180.

Naperville North's three morning victories earned them a spot in the final round matches. They were paired with the home team, Metea Valley. The score was tied twelve times during the match. The final score was 300 to 270 in favor of Metea Valley. North was then paired up with Wheaton North to determine the 3rd and 4th place finishers. North put up a valiant effort but was defeated 310 to 210. Final standings were: IMSA, first place; Metea Valley, second place; Wheaton North, third place; Naperville North, fourth place.

What a great bunch of young men, women and coaches! It was a very enjoyable day.

William F. Cody (Buffalo Bill)

Bill Cody was not the blood and thunder killer that many of us have been lead to believe. In fact, he was a very quiet man and in his younger days found the quiet life in the West very much to his liking. During the Civil War he became a guide for the Union forces in the West. This was where he earned the title of "Colonel." All guides were given this title by the Army.

After the war he rode for the Pony Express, a very dangerous occupation during that period of our country when the railroads were being built. He obtained a contract to supply the workers on the tracks with buffalo meat. In eighteen months he killed four thousand buffalos, which earned him the title of "Buffalo Bill."

Once again, the Army called upon him to scout the Sioux and Cheyenne in 1868. In 1876, in single-handed combat, he killed Chief Yellow Hand and later was elected to the Nebraska Legislature.

On March 5, 1870, he was initiated in Platte Valley Lodge No. 32, at North Platte, Nebraska, passed April 2, 1870, and raised January 10, 1871. He was exalted a Royal Arch Mason November 15, 1888 and chose the buffalo head for his Mark. He was knighted April 2, 1889, in Palestine Commandery No. 13, North Platte, Nebraska.

The quiet life of the Legislature did not appeal to Cody so when he was approached by some circus friends, the Buffalo Bill Wild West Show was formed.

William Cody was a good friend of Teddy Roosevelt; they hunted together in the Plains States and, later, the two friends did much to stop the senseless hunting of the buffalo. William Cody was never proud of his killing of the buffalo, but killed only when they were used for food.
